JOBSEEKER REGISTRATIONS RISE 62% AT ALWAYS MOVING FORWARD

The economic downturn is fuelling unemployment figures, with the number of Australians unemployed in the past 12 months rising by 180,000 to 664,000. More and more members of the Jewish community are confronting joblessness — and the challenges which accompany it.

People often define themselves in terms of their employability. The shock of unemployment, regardless of the reasons for job loss, can be extremely demoralising.

Always Moving Forward (AMF) is Jewish Care's training and recruitment service. It is the first port of call for many Jewish jobseekers in Melbourne, whose job search skills are rusty after being in the same job for 10 or 15 years, or who are facing critical skill gaps in areas of technology and communications.

Jobseeker registration at AMF has far outstripped the national average, with a 62% rise in the number of jobseekers registering with the organisation in 2009.

AMF's mission is to see each individual as a whole person and to restore confidence.

Always Moving Forward's quality training programs include computer courses in key business essentials such as MYOB, Word and Excel. The staff assist with resume writing, job search and interviewing skills.

First established in 2004 to address the needs of the orthodox community, AMF has expanded to cater for all segments of the Jewish community, assisting 109 jobseekers to secure employment since January 2008. With rigorously screened candidates covering the entire spectrum of professional expertise, and a no-fee policy to either employer or candidates, AMF offers a recruitment solution for companies of all sizes.


Jewish Care Exceeds Annual Appeal Target

BEST INVESTMENT WE'VE EVER MADE

Jump Start, Jewish Care's Jewish Mutual Loan Fund, has been providing interest free loans to Victoria's Jewish community for over 120 years. The Jewish Mutual Loan Committee was launched in 1888 with a donation of ten guineas; that same ten guineas is effectively still in circulation today.

Jump Start loans are part of Jewish Care's suite of financial services. The concept is simple: Jump Start lends money to individuals without charging interest, but with the expectation that every loan will be repaid. A 99% repayment rate shows that the system works.

To help more families manage their financial challenges, Jewish Care has revised eligibility criteria to facilitate easier borrowing.

Funds are currently available to enable members of the Jewish community to improve their quality of life through the purchase of a new appliance

or better health care, or by undertaking vocational or personal development.

Repayment schedules are flexible and eligibility is based on a demonstrated ability to repay the loan. Enquiries are private and all information is treated with the highest degree of confidentiality.

SETTING UP A FAMILY CHARITABLE TRUST

Are you thinking about taking your giving to a higher level? Are you:

PPF's are soon to be renamed Private Ancillary Funds; however, you may be more familiar with the term Prescibed Private Fund, as they have become a popular legal structure used by families, individuals or companies to establish grant-making foundations.

PPFs are relatively simple to establish and maintain, and enable families to control their giving. They do not require public donations and offer valuable tax benefits. THE VISION OF GLEN EIRA ROAD TAKES SHAPE

In December this year, Jewish Care's Glen Eira Road complex will be officially opened to provide full time accommodation for 16 adults with disabilities as well as our first respite relief for those looking after family members.

We are looking forward to our first residents moving in early next year.

The Glen Eira Road project was launched nearly four years ago at Jewish Care's Gala Dinner in 2006 in response to the community's pressing need for disability care.

Designed in consultation with members of the community, the complex will offer a variety of private and communal spaces. The project represents a conceptual breakthrough



in community inclusiveness for people with a disability, providing opportunities for a dramatically enhanced quality of life.

Residents will be able to take part in social activities and get involved in community events, while also enjoying their independence and freedom of choice in a safe, structured environment.

THE HON JUSTINE ELLIOT MP OFFICIALLY OPENS GARY SMORGON HOUSE

Gary Smorgon House, Jewish Care's newest aged care facility, received an enthusiastic reception at its official opening on July 7th.

Around 300 guests, including representatives of Federal, State and Local Government and key leaders of the Jewish community attended the festive event, together with residents. The Hon Justine Elliot MP, Federal Minister for Ageing, praised Jewish Care for the successful culmination of its vision to service the growing aged care needs of the Victorian Jewish community.

Gary Smorgon House raises the bar on the level of culturally-sensitive aged care service delivery available to members of the Jewish community. Visitors appreciated the attention to detail evident throughout the facility – from fully furnished bedrooms with private ensuites to stunning communal areas and garden spaces.

Gary Smorgon House's ageing-in-place model means that the changing care needs of residents can be accommodated, in many cases, without having to move rooms.

The facility's central location on Freeman Street, Caulfield, is within easy access of relatives and friends.

The residence offers a blend of fine cuisine with traditional Jewish cookery, prepared by an in-house chef in a purpose-built kosher kitchen. Artist-designed stained glass windows adorn the in-house shul, and a specially preprogrammed Shabbos lift — a unique feature in Australia — contributes to the uniquely heimish atmosphere.

DISABILITY SERVICES

\$100,000 ENHANCES SUPPORT FOR PEOPLE WITH DISABILITIES

Jewish Care's Disability Services received two Senior Practitioner Grants totalling \$100,000.

Jewish Care, in partnership with Deakin University, will use the first grant to produce a manual for disability support organisations to assist in the implementation of "Active Support" for people with disabilities.

Active Support is an innovative approach to disability services where support staff encourage the participation of people with a disability in daily activities, adapting their assistance according to the capabilities of each particular individual, as those abilities develop over time.

Jewish Care also received a second grant to fund participation in a group study coordinated by Latrobe University based on the organisational factors that impact on the quality of life for residents with complex needs.

\$28K FOR CHILDREN'S RESPITE HOUSE

Jewish Care has received \$28,000, funding another 20 days of operation for the Children's Respite House.

The funding was received from the Isobel Hill Brown Charitable Trust Account Jewish Charities and the Ethel Herman Charitable Trust Account Children's Charities, managed by Perpetual. The Children's Respite House provides customised respite for families of children with disabilities aged 6 – 18 years, enabling parents, carers and siblings to take a break from their usual caring duties. It is the only respite facility in Victoria which provides a culturally sensitive environment for members of the Jewish community.

This additional funding enables the Children's Respite House to operate 236 days a year. With demand for respite services extremely high, Jewish Care is seeking further funding to keep the Children's Respite House open all year round.

\$50K GRANT PROVIDES COMFORT FOR SUNDOWNER SUFFERERS

Often associated with Alzheimer's Disease, sufferers of Sundowner's Syndrome experience periods of extreme agitation and confusion during the late afternoon or early evening hours, often leading to irritability towards other residents, caregivers or nursing staff.

Jewish Care successfully secured a \$50,000 grant from the Ian Rollo Currie Estate Foundation to increase support for residents suffering with the challenging effects of Sundowner's

Syndrome. The initiative will provide two additional Lifestyle Therapists to the Smorgon High Care Nursing Home who will assist residents by engaging them with a range of activities that provide gentle, routine mental and physical stimulation within a secure, supportive environment.

ADVANCING ACTIVE SERVICE FOR OLDER PEOPLE



As one of 30 pilot organisations implementing the "Active Service" Model of care provision for older people, Jewish Care has been invited by the Department of Human Services to assist in the development of the Active Service Model across the industry.

Current research shows that an active lifestyle is a key factor in helping people to maintain independence and physical and emotional wellbeing as they age.

The Active Service Model is the latest approach to service delivery for older people, where staff work alongside clients, encouraging their ongoing involvement in day to day activities. It aims to help people strive to the highest level of independence that they can achieve, which

includes active involvement in decision making about their own life.

As the Active Service Model challenges preconceived notions of care provision for older people, its implementation involves significant staff development and coaching as well as community education.

The Services for Older People suite of services — Kesher, Blue Star and the Healthy Ageing programs — have been actively trialling tools and processes for the implementation of the Active Service Model and are providing feedback to the Department of Human Services to further refine the tool before it is released into the broader sector. By participating in this project, Jewish Care will also be able to provide an additional voice on behalf of the particular needs of ethnospecific care providers and their respective communities.

EMMANUEL SANTOS FOCUSES ON PHOTOGRAPHY

Jewish Care's Mental Health Program aims to support people in our community struggling with psychological or emotional disorders. One of the Program's initiatives is the Creative Arts Therapy Project, which provides a meaningful outlet for participants to find expression, respect and support.

Acclaimed photographer Emmanuel Santos is lending his expertise to Jewish Care's Creative Arts Therapy Project with a 12-week course on photography entitled "Point of View".

Around 20% of adults are affected by some form of mental disorder every year. Given appropriate treatment and support, most people affected by mental illness recover well and are able to lead fulfilling lives. However, mental health care receives minimal government assistance, and only half of those affected actually receive the treatment they need.

Funded by a generous grant from the Bardas Family Foundation in memory of the late Sandra Bardas, participants in "Point of View" are loaned a digital camera for the duration of the course. Emmanuel Santos will guide and mentor the group's weekly sessions, exploring the photographic medium as a vehicle for expression, reflection and commentary.

The course will culminate in a final display at the Jewish Museum running from 20th December 2009 through 17th January 2010, marking the Creative Arts Therapy Project's third exhibition.
