2012 Annual Appeal and Gala Dinner

Helping Thousands Takes Millions

Over 650 people gathered at Jewish Care's Gala Dinner, held on 16 February at Caulfield Racecourse, launching the 2012 Annual Appeal in support of those in need in our community.

This year's Annual Appeal theme, Giving is in Our Nature, has emphasised human individuality and that the ability to give is hardwired within each person.

"Our parents and grandparents came to Australia with little or no means to support themselves, and yet, they always found ways to share with others. From a very young age, we were nurtured by our families with certain values and traditions. Giving tzedakah is an integral part of all of us," said Bruce Rosengarten, Jewish Care's President.

This year, Jewish Care aims to raise \$5.3 million to cover the ongoing provision of its vital community services, including housing assistance, financial services, counselling, healthy ageing programs, mental health services, cultural and spiritual services, information and referral and kosher food provision. These programs receive little or no government funding, and rely primarily on public donations.

David Smorgon OAM, the Appeal's longstanding supporter and Patron, called out to the community with a personal request to make a practical change to the lives of many and encouraged the attendees to continue the circle of giving: "We all play a role in our community. Now is your chance to show your connection and assist those in need. And it is always better to be a giver than a taker."

Throughout the Gala Dinner, participants were moved by captivating presentations, including an inspirational film, It's Wonderful, highlighting Jewish Care's role in strengthening the wellbeing of the Victorian Jewish community and securing its sustainable future.

A Lesson for All

When the crowded ship MV Napoli docked in Melbourne on 2 June 1950, it marked the beginning of a new life for 20-year-old Holocaust survivor Henri Korn, which years later, would be heralded for his spirit of giving.

"We lost everything in Germany, and when we came to Australia, we lived in an Australian Jewish Welfare society-owned house on Burke Rd in Camberwell," said Henri.

To his surprise, Henri recently became the recipient of our 2012 Volunteer of the Year Award. But being a Holocaust survivor who experienced first-hand intolerance and ignorance, Henri's ongoing efforts to educate new Jewish Care's employees about Judaism and the traumas of the Holocaust survivors, makes him a shining example of the impact one person can have on other people's lives.

"Receiving saved our lives. Believe me,

it's much nicer to be on the giving end," said Henri.

For seven years Henri has been a committed volunteer on our Claims Conference Holocaust Survivors Committee, representing child survivors of the Holocaust. More recently he was invited as a regular speaker at our monthly Ethos Day, where he helps staff familiarise themselves with Jewish lifestyle and understand the trauma some Holocaust survivor clients continue to experience until today.

Henri is also on the Holocaust Museum Board of Directors and a Holocaust Museum guide; as well as the President of Melbourne Child Survivors of the Holocaust, often speaking at schools.

So what motivates Henri to continue his outstanding voluntary work?

"I volunteer because I remember my past, and I want our survivors to be living in old age as comfortably as possible," he said.

Pay it Forward

Leading a successful screen printing business for 15 years, Peter Pfeifer-Benet could not imagine that his partial vision loss was the early sign of developing Multiple Sclerosis (MS), a complicated chronic disease, which affects the central nervous system and brain function, causing abnormal muscle spasms and speech impediment.

As Peter's health seriously deteriorated restricting his mobility, he was forced to leave the workforce. Having no relatives, Peter contacted Jewish Care's Disability Services seeking support.

"Every day Jewish Care's staff member or volunteer visits me to help with my numerous medications, and also takes me to the park or shopping at Chadstone," says Peter.

Sadly, at the age of fifty, he finds it hard to walk more than ten metres. Nevertheless, his severe medical condition doesn't stop Peter from volunteering at Smorgon Nursing Home on St Kilda Rd twice a week.

Purim Joy Packaged

Sending colourful food packages to family and friends, known as Mishloach Manot, is an exciting, ancient Purim practice loved by kids and adults alike.

In February, our volunteers united once again at Jewish Care's pre-Purim Working Bee Day. They enjoyed decorating greeting cards and sorting through thousands of candies and chocolates.

"The room was filled with so much simcha and energy," said volunteer Sara Goldberg. "I have no doubt that each one of us left feeling happier and more fulfilled in our achievement."

During the Working Bee Day, participants packed 1600 gift bags that were later distributed to residents, clients and community members, bringing them much joy. A native of Warsaw, Peter spends hours talking to high-care residents in Polish and Russian, going back in time to rediscover their dear memories of living in pre-War Europe.

"I make friends with people who lost their loved ones in the Holocaust. I am also lonely, so we are like family," says Peter.

Thanks to Hadley Bortz, a young pharmacist at the Alfred Hospital and our new dedicated volunteer who regularly drives Peter home, he can continue to visit our residents to their delight.

"Jewish Care's Volunteering Department introduced me to Peter after accessing my capacities and full-time work commitments," says Hadley. "I am very happy to assist Peter in achieving his volunteering goals. He is doing a wonderful job in helping others."

National IT Award for **Iewish** Care

Jewish Care has won a national peak body award for the establishment of a new IT data centre in Melbourne CBD and superfast cable link to its St Kilda Rd site.

Jewish Care was awarded the Aged Care Association Australia's (ACAA's) Best Implementation of the Year Award for Infrastructure at the 2012 National Information Technology in Aged Care (ITAC) Awards, held at Crown Casino on 19 April.

The Award recognises Jewish Care's creation of a highly advanced, quick, resilient and safe IT centre, using state-of-the-art technology - and it's even green!

Jewish Care's IT Manager, Cameron Mackay, explained: "We needed to replace our servers that were at capacity. Now we have an external data centre with a much more flexible and scalable system, needed to introduce new advanced methods of managing and sharing information across the range of Jewish Care services."

"It's green – using less power than our old servers which is better for the environment - and it's safe. The security exceeds anything we could have here at Jewish Care. This includes power, cooling, fire systems and physical security."

Jewish Care's CEO, Bill Appleby, said: "This Award validates the great work of our IT team and our direction in building a solid base for the deployment of quality software that will assist our staff to deliver improved care and support to our residents and clients."

Expanding Respite Services to Adults

In February, Jewish Care opened the doors of the Glen Eira Villas Adult Respite Centre in response to the diverse needs of Jewish adults with disabilities, and focusing on their transition to independent living in a supportive, inclusive, culturally specific environment.

Before its establishment, Jewish Care could only provide respite services to children under the age of eighteen and their families.

"Having an adult respite centre in the heart of our community has been a dream for many people. We are very proud to have made this dream a reality in only one year," said Bill Appleby, CEO Jewish Care.

The Centre was launched in the presence of Parliamentary Secretary for Families & Community Services, Ms Andrea Coote MLC, who recognised the joint efforts of staff and donors: "Through the remarkable fundraising efforts and the philanthropic impulses on the one hand, with the Jewish Care imperative on the other - you have provided the opportunity for that to happen."

The opening was made possible thanks to generosity of community members, including Dianne Gringlas and Liz Nissen who spearheaded the fundraising project with passion, generating over \$737,000 over three years.

An uncomfortable bed in a hospitallike facility with long, unpleasant corridors, is one of the first early childhood memories John Beckman has. His parents and twin brother perished in the Holocaust, while John's grandmother miraculously survived Auschwitz. After the end of the war, she managed to find 5-year-old John, and together they moved to Israel and later to Australia.

In 1968, John met his future wife Evelyn, a medical technologist from Perth, whose parents escaped Germany in midst of the World War II. The couple was married in 1970.

For many years John and Evelyn led a very busy lifestyle raising their four children: Debbie, Anita, Adam and Daniel, and running a successful furniture removal business.

Unfortunately, John suffered a stroke in 2007. While in hospital, Evelyn took care of her husband, who was unable to continue working.

"Suddenly, our business stopped and I didn't know what to do with myself.

Book of Deuteronomy: "Today you have become a nation." (27:9-10)

Since then, every Shavuot Jewish people commemorate the revelation and acceptance of the Torah, highlighting the significance of Jewish morals and culture in modern life.

Interestingly, in Hebrew, the word *Shavuot* means 'weeks', which refers to the seven-week countdown period between Pesach and Shavuot, known as *Sefirat Haomer*. During that time, it is customary to dedicate one's time to personal growth by refining character traits, doing more praiseworthy deeds and helping others in preparation for the upcoming Holy Day.
