On 21st May at Leonda by the Yarra in Hawthorn, nearly 400 philanthropists and supporters came together to raise money for Jewish Care Victoria's 2013 Annual Appeal.

Under the banner of 'Celebrating 165 Years' of Jewish Care and its predecessor organisations, the audience was treated to an evening of tender emotions, warmth and laughter which showcased the heart of Jewish Care and its importance in the community throughout the generations.

The night opened on a humourous note with a short video of aged care residents telling jokes. This was followed up later in the evening with an equally amusing video of residents reacting to the popular music video 'Gangnam Style'.

Entertainment was provided by Eva Migdalek who sang in English and Yiddish. Eva, who regularly sings for Gary Smorgon House residents, including her husband who suffers dementia, brought tears to many eyes. The home grown theme continued as Eva was joined by our talented Young Achievers Program graduate Ilana Charnelle.

Guest speaker Kate Weiss gripped the audience with her heartfelt story of daughter Amy, who lives with a disability and attends Jewish Care's Children's Respite House and how the service has allowed her family to have 'a life' again. She also conveyed the importance of Jewish Care in providing her family much needed 'time out' to rest and re-energise.

Melissa Davis, Appeal Dinner Chair challenged guests with an honest comparison of 'first world problems' versus 'real world problems', and rallied them to give generously to those less fortunate. In keeping with the generational theme, Davis urged the younger generation to recognise that it is now their turn to 'take the baton' from our elders.

Other highlights of the evening included the Appeal video titled 'I Found a Fruitful World', a thoughtprovoking story of the Victorian Jewish community's growth over the generations using interviews and authentic images of past and present.

Past President of Montefiore Homes for the Aged, Barry Fradkin OAM was awarded the newly-named Leo and Mina Fink Community Service Award, for his outstanding and long-standing service to Jewish Care and the Jewish community of Victoria. The award was presented by Leo and Mina's son Nathan.

Second Chance

When Otto Lazar arrived at the Mark and Dina Munzer Community Residence for respite, no one could have imagined his age. Despite limited mobility, he was very independent and quickly made friends with everyone around him including Rabbi Yoni Reyder, Minister of Munzer Community Residence.

Upon visiting Otto in his room, Rabbi Reyder noticed quite a few framed certificates on the wall. One of them was a letter from Queen Elizabeth congratulating Otto on the occasion of his recent 100th Birthday.

Rabbi Reyder offered Otto to put on *Teffilin*, which he readily agreed to do. When Rabbi Reyder wrapped the *Teffilin* around Otto's head, his eyes were full of tears. He slowly repeated the prayer after the Rabbi, word by word. Then they spoke for a while and Rabbi Reyder left the room feeling very touched.

Soon after, Rabbi found out that Otto never had a proper Bar Mitzvah. The next Saturday in *shul*, Rabbi offered Otto to be called up to the Torah for an *aliyah*. When Otto gazed at the Torah he suddenly began to cry. The congregants and staff started to worry that something may have happened to him.

Indeed, something truly special did happen. Otto had just experienced his Bar Mitzvah. A celebration followed, with cakes, songs and words of encouragement.

"A B'nei Mitzvah is one of the fundamental events in the life of every Jewish person," said Rabbi Reyder. "It's about inclusion and becoming a responsible member of the Jewish community. It was an honour to organise a proper celebration for Otto."

"I always thought that a Bar Mitzvah was intended for 13-year-olds and, therefore, I missed my opportunity long ago in 1926," said Otto. "But, thanks to Jewish Care, I've learnt that it's never too late to be included in communal life and to celebrate our Jewish heritage. As a result of my Bar Mitzvah, I feel much better; not exactly as a 13-year-old but certainly not my age."

Offering a Healing Hand

Jewish Care hosted an exhibition of artwork by adults living with a mental health condition to raise awareness and to support participants in their journey to recovery.

The program of art-based workshops began in October 2012 and enabled participants to create works that represent their own concepts of 'safe places'.

Mental Health Team Leader Bronwen Taylor said it was not coincidental that the works used as their basis the 'hamsa', a palm-shaped amulet, which is a recognised symbol of protection for Jewish people.

"The Safe Places Project encourages and supports clients to create art and stories reflecting ideas about places which make them feel safe, comforted and protected," Ms Taylor explained.

"Whilst creating art is a rewarding process in itself, the opportunity to display these works is a unique experience that enables our clients to share their journey with family, friends and the broader community."

Jewish Care's Mental Health Program provides recovery orientated groups for adults living with a mental health condition. Delivered by caring professionals, the service aims to foster a sense of belonging and connection with the community, and assist each person to recovery and independence.

165 Years of Community Service

In February, Jewish Care's 165th anniversary was launched at the Windsor Hotel Grand Ballroom in the presence of the former Premier of Victoria, Mr Ted Baillieu MLA.

He spoke glowingly of the contribution the Victorian Jewish community has made to the history and development of Victorian political, social, cultural and economic life and wellbeing. He also acknowledged Jewish Care as one of the most respected and oldest philanthropic organisations in Victoria, assisting the Victorian Jewish community for so many years.

Jennifer Huppert, Vice President of the JCCV addressed the guests with words of encouragement and support, thanking Jewish Care for being such an important and integral organisation



for the Victorian Jewish community throughout so many generations.

Jewish Care CEO Bill Appleby said he was delighted that the event attracted such a wonderful list of strong supporters with over 200 people in attendance, including members of Parliament, past Presidents, Life Governors, major philanthropists and other dignitaries and guests.

President Mike Debinski gave a heartfelt speech to a very appreciative audience.

"Jewish Care and its predecessors helped society's most vulnerable since the mid-1800s. We accommodated the 1930s, assisted the Holocaust survivors as they arrived penniless and traumatised from their experiences, and assisted immigrants from Eastern Europe and the former USSR in the 1940s and then again in the '70s and '80s. We also established Victoria's largest Jewish aged care residence, Montefiore Homes, in 1948," said Mr Debinski. "Jewish Care will continue to build an inclusive community where elders are valued and given opportunities to live full and active lives; and where families and individuals are supported to be capable, resilient and strong."

Minister for Health Recognises Lifetime of Volunteering

The 2013 Minister for Health Volunteer Awards were held during National Volunteer Week in May and Jewish Care is extremely proud to announce that Mrs Yvonne Rosengarten was awarded the "Outstanding Individual Achievement" in the Primary Care category.

The award was presented by the Minister for Health, Mr David Davis MP, at a special ceremony celebrating the commitment, dedication and achievements of all volunteers in Victorian healthcare and, in particular, those nominated in the 2013 Awards.

For her entire life, Yvonne has selflessly given her time and love to those in need in the community. She started her journey of giving as a committed volunteer of the Frances Barkman House for Jewish Orphans, run by the Australian Jewish Welfare Society in the 1950s. Over the years, she opened her hearts to numerous post-war child refugees, foster care recipients and aged care residents, in particular, those living with dementia.

"Winning the award is a great honour but I never volunteered for myself," Yvonne said, "I always did it for the benefit of others, especially worthy causes like the Jewish Welfare Society and now Jewish Care."

Today at the age of 90, Yvonne spends time each week volunteering at Gary Smorgon House in Caulfield as a friendly companion to lonely residents. Although Yvonne visits all residents, she pays special attention to isolated dementia clients. This is extremely challenging, especially as the individuals she visits are often her peers.

Our warmest congratulations go to Phillip Shulman and Miriam Suss for both being honoured this year with a Medal of the Order of Australia in the General Division.


Phillip has been honoured for service to the community of Victoria through a range of multicultural, charitable and social welfare organisations.

Phillip was President of Jewish Care (formerly Jewish Welfare), 1986-1990; Honorary Solicitor, 1967-2002; Board Member, 1967-2002 and is a current Life Governor.

Miriam is honoured for services to the Jewish community. Miriam's history with Jewish Care includes

Social Worker, JCS, 1972-1987; Manager, Social Work Services, JCS, 1987-1998; Acting CEO, JCS; General Manager Development 2010-2011.

In Memory of Avram Zeleznikow

Born in 1924 in Vilna to Jewish revolutionaries, Avram was a strong leader, who always fought for social justice and gave of himself for the benefit of the most vulnerable people in his community. In fact, his surname, Zeleznikow, is translated from Slavic meaning 'iron ore', which truly represents Avram's strong beliefs and values.

He was the only member of his family who survived the Holocaust, by crawling through 50 km of pipelines and joining the partisans in the Lithuanian and Polish forests.

In 1946, he met his wife-to-be, Masha at the University of Lodz. Separately the couple fled the prospect of communism in Poland. They were refugees in Paris, where they married in 1948 and moved to Australia in 1951. It was difficult starting a new life in Melbourne, especially without knowing how to speak English. Avram worked a range of jobs, from driver to dry cleaner and Yiddish teacher, prior to opening the iconic Café Scheherazade with Masha.

Located on Acland St, Scheherazade quickly became a famous hub for many Holocaust survivors, local actors, writers and artists, providing them with food for body and soul.

For over forty years, Avram was involved in a myriad of community causes including the Victorian Jewish Board of Deputies, Executive Council of Australian Jewry, Mount Scopus College and, of course, the Australian Jewish Welfare Society and Jewish Care.

He was our dedicated Secretary, Treasurer, President, Chairman of Claims Conference Committee and a member of various committees including Financial Aid and Healthy Ageing. In addition, together with Masha, Avram ran the Tuesday Club for Jewish seniors for over 32 years.

The day before Avram's heart attack which led to his sad passing at the age of 89, he delivered an emotional speech at the Tuesday Club about the life of the famous humanitarian Raoul Wallenberg, who rescued thousands of Jews in WWII. Avram will be long remembered for his selfless work in helping Holocaust survivors to integrate into Australian society and reconstruct their lives.

"Avram will be greatly missed by his loving family, friends and community members for his exceptionally caring personality impacting so many lives around him." said Mike Debinski, President, Jewish Care.

Brett Nathan, Yosl Cylich and Galit Klas are young, ambitious and passionate about Jewishness and making the world a better place. They are pioneers of the very first home-based Jewish community for young adults in Australia called Moishe House.

Founded in 2006 in the US and now in 13 countries, Moishe House envisions itself as the global leader of pluralistic Jewish life for adults in their 20s and aims to promote new Jewish leadership by providing young adults the opportunity to create and develop their own communities.

Inspired by the model's international success, environmentalist and community activist Brett put together a group and applied to become the residents of Moishe House Melbourne. Brett. Galit and Yosl are in their twenties and leading a busy life; be it finalising a university degree, working or volunteering. They have one thing in common - a strong desire to nourish a young Jewish community.

"The best part of living a Moishe House life is being able to meet people from all walks of life, all sharing one goal to experience Judaism in an inclusive, comfortable environment," said Yosl.

From regular Shabbat dinners, shiurim and movie nights to workshops, boot camps and concerts, the Moishe House life is booming in Melbourne.

Understanding the importance of this development, Australian Jewish Funders and Jewish Care have partnered to help facilitate the establishment and operation of Moishe House Melbourne.

David Werdiger, Director of Australian Jewish Funders, who strongly supports the cause says, "The Moishe House concept gives young people the latitude and autonomy to find their own expressions of Jewishness and to use this to connect with their peers."

Organised by Reuben Zelwer, Dion Epstein and Joel Fixler, the event is now




in its 4th year of supporting the two community organisations. This year the players raised over \$6000 from friends and families who sponsored them. The money will be shared equally between the charities.

Thanks to their terrific show, an interested crowd surrounded the performers, complimenting their talents and showing interest in Jewish Care's work.


As a result, \$50 was raised, giving much happiness and confidence to the young activists of social justice.

Looking on the Bright Side

She is always on the go, rushing to a concert or a lecture, reading, writing or giving a talk at a community function.

Her name is Esther Werblud; a 90-yearold Holocaust Survivor and resident of Gary Smorgon House, Esther is a true inspiration to everyone around her.

Born in Bialystok, Poland and leaving behind seven concentration camps including Majdanek, Auschwitz and Bergen-Belsen, she moved to Australia in 1947, suffering from an unbearable loss of her parents and fiancé. However, despite her horrible memories, Esther decided to reconstruct her life and stay positive.

"My experience of the Holocaust taught me that my positive thoughts helped me to survive and be able to assist my camp sisters," said Esther. "I've also learnt to have hope in every situation and to look on the bright side."

Together with her late husband Philip, Esther had two children, Israel and Shirley, and today is a happy grandmother of five and great-grandmother of two.

Over the years, Esther has been actively involved in various community organisations such as the Kadimah, Jewish Holocaust Centre, WIZO. MDA, UIA and Jewish Care.

Being a passionate supporter of Jewish Care, Esther still attends our AGM, Friends of Montefiore and Circle of Care functions. She is a committed bequestor who strongly believes in leaving a legacy for future generations.

"It is very important to support Jewish and local organisations; I still remember how hard life was for Jewish people in Poland, where anti-Semitism was prevailing," said Esther. "We should be grateful to this country for allowing us to start a new life here, and we need to give back to our community."

A Recipe for Success

In April, Jewish Care's Young Achievers Program Alumni (YAPA) held a cooking night with former MasterChef contestant Alice Zaslavsky at the home of Amanda and Colin Sacks.



MESSAGE FROM OUR RABBI

A Good Place to Start



If you have ever ventured down the cobble-stoned streets of the Old City in Jerusalem, you would have beheld the image of the remnants of the Western Wall.

This wall serves to remind us not only of the Jerusalem Temple's past glory back in the good old days but also of future possibilities to strive for.

Our daily prayers focus on the return of Jewish people to Zion, to Israel, to our homeland; but is this just a prayer and a wish or can it become a reality?

We are told that the destruction of the temples came about because of hatred and divisiveness within the ranks of our own people; and we are told that the rebuilding of the temple and the realisation of our hopes will be built on selfless love; on acts of goodness and kindness.
