




MESSAGE FROM OUR PRESIDENT AND CEO

Change Somebody's Tomorrow

The 2019 Annual Appeal was launched on 27 February and aims to raise \$3.5 million to help fund social services, during the campaign period ending 30 June.

With little or no funding from the government, Jewish Care will once again rely on financial support from the community to continue to care for vulnerable people.

As a provider of vital services, we offer a variety of supports and programs including housing for those who are at risk of homelessness, employment opportunities, financial aid and healthy ageing, to name a few. As a direct consequence of our involvement, over 6000 people are benefitted yearly, making life less stressful for them.

This year, a range of fundraising activities were launched as part of the broader appeal campaign. These include direct mail, print and outdoor advertising, social and online media, seven Major Donor Dinners, a Tzedakah Sunday Telethon and posters. A video was also developed around the theme 'The greatest thing you'll do today...is change somebody's tomorrow,' which is a real life story of our clients, Noah and his aunt. Nat.

Noah and his aunt, Nat, were innocent victims of someone else's behaviour, who were able to turn their lives around with the support of Jewish Care. They were assisted with housing, employment, financial aid and parenting support, which are programs mostly funded by our community.

Thank you for your generous contributions so far and constant inspiration. It is you who help us to continue to care for thousands of individuals each year.

On 1 March 2019, Jewish Care celebrated the halfway point in construction of The Hannah and Daryl Cohen Family Building with special guests including Hannah Cohen and family, and the Federal Treasurer, The Hon. Josh Frydenberg MP.

James Paterson, Senator for Victoria; Nina Taylor MP, Josh Burns, Labor candidate; Kate Ashmor, Liberal candidate; David Southwick MP, Member for Caulfield, and Dick Gross, Mayor of the City of Port Philip, past and current Jewish Care Board members, Major Donors, Elders and supporters of Jewish Care were also in attendance to celebrate this special event.

"Today is a milestone for Jewish Care," said Mr. Frydenberg. "The fact that this building is the contemporary vision of the original founders of Jewish Care is very special. A nine-storey building, seven of which are devoted to homes for senior citizens and the other two storeys for other essential services is a really modern vision for a communal organisation such as Jewish Care."

Jewish Care President Mike Debinski thanked all donors and supporters for "helping to realise this dream for our

community." He said, "by supporting our Capital Campaign projects, you become part of something truly historic and instrumental in shaping the future care of our community".

The Hannah and Daryl Cohen Family Building development received further impetus last year, when the Labor government pledged \$625,000 during their visit to Jewish Care as part of the election campaign. Martin Foley MP, Philip Dalidakis MP, and Labor candidates representing the Andrews government toured the construction site and chatted with Elders at Montefiore Homes during their visit last year.

Jewish Care CEO Bill Appleby thanked Ministers Foley and Dalidakis, and the Labor candidates for taking the time to visit Jewish Care and said, "We welcome the Andrews government's pledge to support the construction, which will not only provide an inclusive and heimish home for our Elders, but also be a welcoming and vibrant hub for the community to share."

Located at the corner of Union Street and Punt Road, the building is expected to open early 2020.

The Carnegie Senior Living Community and Anne & Eric Smorgon Active Living Centre developments were two others projects that were finalised recently, with building contracts awarded to ARC3 and Four Square Pty Ltd, respectively.

The \$38 million contract for the 120-bed Senior Living Community in Carnegie will provide bespoke aged care services to the Jewish community in the South Eastern suburbs.

The Anne & Eric Smorgon Active Living Centre will support healthy ageing for Elders living at Gary Smorgon House and independently in the local community. The \$7 million modern facility will feature consulting rooms, a gymnasium, meeting and administrative rooms, training and outreach services, allied health services, respite services for the wider community, and a new dedicated shule. The entrance to Gary Smorgon House and ground floor community spaces, including the café, will also be refurbished as part of the construction.









Community Housing in East St Kilda

Community Housing in East St Kilda has always been a safe haven for the Jewish community who are at risk of homelessness. As part of the Capital Campaign, a two-stage approach was adopted in upgrading and refurbishing our existing property in Fulton Street.

In Stage One, 36 units in Bontschek Court were extensively refurbished with more open spaces for dining and living, upgrades to bedrooms and bathrooms, and laundry facilities added to each unit. This stage was completed in August last year, and clients have settled in.

Stage Two will see 33 new one to three bedroom units built over three levels. These modern units will be accessible for all abilities and religious observance.

Enriching Lives For 170 Years

On 19 November 2018, Jewish Care reached a monumental milestone of turning 170 years old.

It all started in 1848, when a small group of community representatives met at the Rainbow Tavern on Swanston Street and resolved to form the Melbourne Jewish Philanthropic Society, the predecessor of today's Jewish Care.

Over the years, generation after generation of communityminded individuals have continued to dedicate themselves to the vision that was imbued by early visionaries: to support the wellbeing of the Jewish community of Victoria. Today, we are Victoria's largest provider of social services for the Jewish community.

Our 170th Anniversary was celebrated in the presence of past Presidents, Life Governors, staff, volunteers, donors and many community supporters at the elegant Quat Quatta Receptions in Ripponlea.

CEO Bill Appleby hosted the evening commencing with the launch of a new video featuring a line-up of dedicated supporters, complimenting Jewish Care on reaching this milestone.

Four guest speakers took to the stage to share stories of their longstanding relationships with Jewish Care in a range of roles, including Dr. John Serry, Melissa Davis, Barbara Belfer, and Dorothy Kovacs.

"I have watched Jewish Care develop and grow over the last 17 years into this unique and magnificent organisation that touches the hearts of many and enriches the lives of thousands every year," said Melissa Davis, Chair of the Annual Appeal Committee and Co-Chair of the Generations of Women Committee. "We are so lucky to have Jewish Care; no other religious or cultural community has anything like it, and it is run by management and a board that is professional, authentic and genuine, with an eye on the future needs of the community."

Another important announcement was the production of a new hardcover book featuring inspiring people connected to Jewish Care. This beautiful book of portraits, entitled '170 Years - Enriching Lives of the Jewish Community', will stand as a tribute to the organisation and the many people who have represented it through the decades.

The assistance of a highly respected team of current and past leaders were sought to select over 70 people to be profiled. from over 200 public nominations. The book, which is currently in production is planned for release later this year.









Jewish Care Joins the National Redress Scheme

Jewish Care has become the first major provider of services to the Victorian Jewish community to join the National Redress Scheme.

The scheme was established on 1 July 2018, and is a key recommendation from the Royal Commission into institutional responses to child sexual abuse.

The scheme offers eligible abuse survivors a redress payment of up to \$150,000, access to psychological counselling, and a direct personal response from the responsible institution if requested. But while survivors can apply for redress at any time, the relevant institution must have joined the scheme for their application to be processed.

Jewish Care was one of the first organisations in Victoria to launch its own scheme in 2013, The Children in Residential Care Support Scheme, and is committed to participating in the National Redress Scheme for its ten-year duration.





Open Day to Experience Respite Centre

The Coppel & Piekarski Family Disability Respite Centre opened its doors to friends and family to learn more about the programs and services at the Centre, including:

- Short term accommodation
- Emergency accommodation
- Kids afters school programs

The open day included a range of fun activities for kids and a tour and information session for parents. Visitors were also introduced to staff working at the Centre.

The cornerstone of The Manders Villas is an inviting and inclusive communal hub to host recreational programs, engage with people and celebrate special events. Many organisations have already established their programs at the hub, including Our Village Kitchen, Our Kitchen Table, Zooz, Access Inc. and Maccabi Victoria All

Flying Fox became our newest partner to move in and share our office space at The Manders Villas.

Flying Fox is a youth led organisation that opens lifechanging opportunities for kids with special needs. They promote positive social interactions by running fun recreational camps.

"We've had great engagement with the work of Flying Fox from its very inception and we know the great work they do for our community," said Jewish Care CEO, Bill Appleby. "We support the lives of many of the same people in our community, so this was a natural progression of our relationship."

Dean Cohen, Founder and CEO of Flying Fox said, "Jewish Care has been there supporting Flying Fox from the beginning and we're thrilled that we can continue to work together to deliver great and innovative services to our community by utilising the office space at The Manders Villas."





Over 3000 Meals for **Our Community!**

The partnership between Jewish Care and Our Village Kitchen has generated over 3,200 meals for our community over a period of 12 months.

The project has developed to attract more volunteers and cooking sessions, enabling to cater to more people from the community. The distribution of healthy home cooked meals has extended beyond Shabbat to include Jewish holidays and festivals

We thank the wonderful residents of The Manders Villas for assisting with food distribution each week; ARK Centre for use of their kosher kitchen, and the terrific students from Bialik College and Mount Scopus Memorial College who have volunteered to help with food preparation.



Young Achievers Graduate

Over 25 teenagers graduated from the Young Achievers Program at the 2018 year-end dinner, held at Caulfield Park Pavilion in December.

Each young achiever received a certificate for exceptional excellence and leadership, and for representing Jewish Care's values during the 12 month program.

The dinner saw graduates and their parents, mentors, Jewish Care staff and leadership team come together to celebrate their participation and achievements.

With 45 youth enrolled in the 2019 program – the largest number on record, it has gained recognition as a valuable mentoring program for youth in the Jewish community. The program welcomes teenagers between the ages 15 - 18 from a range of backgrounds attending Jewish and non-Jewish schools.

The Young Achievers Program and Youth Aspire Program focus on nurturing and developing young people through mentoring workshops. They are also offered scholarships and opportunities for personal growth and leadership development.

Both programs are facilitated by volunteer mentors in the community, and combine informal with formal mentoring sessions. They are committed to supporting and helping our youth become more confident and connect with the Jewish community.

Spearheading LGBTIQ Inclusion

In a historic move, Jewish Care and nine other faith-based organisations signed a pledge committing support to inclusivity for all LGBTIQ people seeking services.

Co-hosted by Jewish Care and Temple Beth Israel, the event was attended by CEOs and representatives of participating organisations.

In addition to signing the multi-faith pledge, Jewish Care is working towards achieving Rainbow Tick Accreditation.

As part of this important work, the Board, Executive and senior leadership attended a training session facilitated by Matthew Parsons from Rainbow Health, the creators of the Rainbow Tick Standards. It will be rolled out to all staff and volunteers to build the learnings into daily practice.

A more recent involvement was walking with eight other Jewish community organisations at the 24th Annual Midsumma Pride March. President Mike Debinski and CEO Bill Appleby marched together with staff, volunteers and Board members under the 'Jews of Pride' banner in February.

"Jewish Care values inclusion for all members of our community. Marching alongside LGBTI+ members of both the Jewish and wider communities, as well as other communal organisations, is one way we can outwardly express our commitment to supporting LGBTI+ people," said Mike Debinski.







Bonding for Greater Outcomes

An agreement signed between Jewish Care and Maccabi Victoria All Abilities will further strengthen our collective efforts to provide social, recreational and sporting activities for people living with disability. Through this partnership, Maccabi Victoria All Abilities will continue to provide a wide range of activities including basketball, table tennis, fitness, schmooze and groove.

Jewish Care CEO Bill Appleby said, "Partnerships such as these strengthen bonds between communal organisations and enhance our ability to deliver person-centred support."

2018 Annual **General Meeting**

Women Tackle Homelessness

The 22nd Annual Generations of Women Brunch saw 320 women come together in support of Jewish Care's Housing program to ease housing pressure for people who are at risk of homelessness.

The brunch raised more than \$90,000 in 2018, surpassing a total of \$1.5 million raised since the launch of the event 22 years ago.

The guest speaker was Andie Halas, the former Director of Australian swimwear company Seafolly and founder of not-for-profit organisation Thread Together. She shared her story of how a random encounter with a mother searching for suitable clothes for her child at the Asylum Seeker Centre motivated her to start Thread Together. The organisation sources brand-new clothing destined for landfill and redistributes it to people in need across

Halas's story was an inspirational reminder to attendees that "possibilities, profitability and social good don't have to be mutually exclusive."

Having such a large family, Boruch Hashem (Thank G-d), makes me feel like the luckiest woman in the world."

What inspired you to work with stencils?
