




MESSAGE FROM OUR PRESIDENT AND CEO

It's wonderful to see so many friendly faces back at work as we return to the new COVID normal way of working. As always, we remain committed to providing a safe environment and will continue to ensure that we follow government health advice and our own strict protocols to keep our elders, community, and staff safe.

Despite the challenges of COVID, we are thrilled to report that through the generosity of the Victorian Jewish community, we have opened three new landmark buildings as part of our ambitious strategic plan of reimagining residential aged care. These developments included the opening of two new state-of-the-art, integrated Senior Living & Community Precincts and two Active Living Centres. The architecture of these new assets enables us to deliver services through our unique Hand-in-Hand™ model of support – an approach in care that is geared towards empowering elders to maintain their independence and to live with confidence and joy during their third age of life. These new propositions have redefined our services and positioned Jewish Care as a leading provider of choice within the broader Jewish community.

As an organisation that's committed to thought leadership and continuous improvement, we were pleased to see several innovative recommendations included in the Aged Care Royal Commission's findings that strongly align to our own direction. We were particularly delighted with the Commission's recommendation to move residential care towards a small household model in design which accords with Jewish Care's contemporary thinking and practice. We applaud the Commissioners for their thorough work over the last 2 years and look forward to a very favourable response by our Federal Government. It is absolute certain that the time for action is now. This once in a generation opportunity to align social policy and subsequent funding with the Australian community's expectations.

Supporting those most vulnerable in the community remains a top priority at Jewish Care. In the last 12 months, over 16,500 calls for support and assistance have been received through our COVID-19 Helpline - up from a typical 6,000 calls per year and this demand continues. In response, Jewish Care has launched its Annual Community Appeal - Enriching Lives Together which aims to raise \$3.6M by 30 June 2021.

Donations to this year's Community Appeal will ensure that we continue to offer services that are not fully funded by Government, from housing, employment, financial aid /counselling to mental health services. It is only through your generosity of spirit that we can continue to support over 6,000 people in need each year. So please, let's help each other through what will no doubt be another tough year as we navigate the road to recovery, by giving generously to Jewish Care's 2021 Community Appeal.

In closing, we would like thank the whole community for your continued support of Jewish Care and wish you peace, prosperity, good health and happiness as we celebrate Pesach.

Due to COVID-19 restrictions the Annual General Meeting had limited physical attendance, which included Jewish Care's Board of Governance and the Executive Leadership Team.

The event opened with a wonderful rendition of the Australian and Israeli anthems sung by Rachel Tigel and a moving prayer by Rabbi Nerenberg, which was followed by a minute's silence to honour the loss of those close to Jewish Care in the past year. Alan Schwartz AM, inaugural President of Jewish Care Victoria, attended the event as guest speaker and spoke of his contribution and passion for serving the Jewish community.


Dr John Serry was awarded the Leo and Mina Fink Community Service Award in

recognition of over 30 years of service to Jewish Care. During his tenure, he was instrumental in the introduction of Financial Counselling, the Saver Plus program, the Accelerated Debt Reduction Loan, Small Business Mentoring Scheme and reshaping of Jewish Care's Financial Services. Under his stewardship, Empower Interest Free Loans grew exponentially, allocating over \$2 million to approximately 150 individuals and families. Today, these loans are in strong demand and fulfil a range of purposes including small business startups, debt consolidation, educational and first-time home ownership.

We thank our Co-Vice President, Lisa Kennett, for chairing the meeting. We also extend our sincerest appreciation to our President, Susie Ivany OAM, CEO, Bill Appleby, and Treasurer, Sharon Gdanski, for their leadership and guidance over the past year and beyond.









Celebrating Ten Years Of Excellence

Jewish Care's 10th Annual Staff and Volunteer Service and Excellence Awards held via Zoom last year, a first for the decade-long event.

The major award for the evening, the Samuel H. Harris Award was presented to Marcus Harty, General Manager, Strategic Projects and Acquisitions, for his work delivering our new state-of-the-art capital

Volunteer of the Year was awarded to two recipients; Errol Rink, who has run weekly News and Views sessions at Gary Smorgon House since 2012, and Leah Jacobs, for taking on multiple community-supporting roles, including as a mentor with the Young Achievers Program.

Service milestones were also celebrated on the night with 98 staff and volunteers acknowledged for their dedication and contributions. Marilyn Faiman was congratulated on 40 years of voluntary service, while Thomas Mitchell, Personal Care Worker from Gary Smorgon House, reached a service milestone of 30 years.

Bill Appleby, Jewish Care Chief Executive Officer, acknowledged "the leadership, resilience, commitment, compassion and resourcefulness of our staff and volunteers over the last 12 months."

Appleby went on to say that all staff "will always be able to look back at this time in history and remember proudly, the year 2020. When the entire world changed, they were busy playing a major role and helping others more vulnerable."

Guest speaker Kath Koschel, founder of for-purpose charity, Kindness Factory, spoke to the importance of resilience after she defied her medical prognosis of paralysis and taught herself to walk - on three separate occasions.

Yesod - A Platform for Growth

Jewish Care's Yesod Board Foundation Program is a highly sought-after program among young emerging leaders as it provides participants with a solid understanding of the professional duties and responsibilities of a for-purpose director. The 10-month program immerses participants in best practice principles of governance exemplified at Jewish Care. It prepares participants to embrace new community opportunities and connect with diverse leaders and community builders to witness the complexities of board leadership in the 21st century. The program, in its five years, has produced over 50 future-focused young leaders.

Now in its sixth year, the Yesod Board Leadership Program's 2021 launch saw 13 new participants welcomed by Jewish Care's CEO, Bill Appleby, at the Hannah & Daryl Cohen Family Building. The induction evening began with Bill showcasing the valuable work of Jewish Care, and the multiple ways that the organisation supports and enriches the Jewish community. Following Bill's presentation, the new group was introduced to their mentors and members of the Board and Executive team, enjoying the opportunity for conversation, connection and networking in the beautiful new courtyard. Jewish Care's President, Susie Ivany OAM, concluded the evening with a presentation on governance familiarisation in preparation for the year ahead.

Adam Joel, Board member said, "It was great to see another cohort of committed and passionate current and future leaders of our community, who are striving to become more empowered through learning about board governance and Jewish Care Victoria".

In December last year, an event was held to celebrate the achievements of the 2020 Yesod Board Foundation Program graduates at the new Schwartz Family Synagogue, located in the Hannah & Daryl Cohen Family Building.

Hannah Hammerschlag, Yesod 2020 participant said, "Yesod opened my eyes to the complex mix of skills, personality and experience that is needed to effectively govern a Not-For-Profit board and opened doors to opportunities that I could never have otherwise achieved this early on in my career".

The program will continue to focus on upskilling young professionals to take on leadership and governance positions in the Jewish community, while also leveraging their professional skills to further Jewish Care's objectives. The Yesod Board Foundation Program, which is now complemented by The Observership Program, is proudly sponsored by the Szalmuk-Singer and Kline-Joel Family.

Meeting Face-to-Face

With over 350 people dedicating their time and resources to support our community, our volunteers are the lifeblood of Jewish Care. Their service is especially important for our elders, who during the COVID-19 pandemic, wrestled with extreme feelings of loss and isolation.

While our resilient volunteers were quick to adapt, maintaining their relationships via social connection calls and Zoom, they were delighted when they were given the green light to resume face-to-face activities in a safe and staggered approach.

"I am really happy that our volunteers are back. I value their presence all the

time," said Henry O'Hana, an elder at Gary Smorgon House. "They are compassionate and I especially enjoy spending one-onone time with them. Thank you very much for your commitment and hard work."

Another elder, Adele Justin, shared a similar sentiment. "I was very excited to see my volunteer after many weeks. When we saw each other we both were happy and tearful. I am looking forward to seeing her on a weekly basis and I hope it won't change," she said.

Addressing Conversion Therapy

On 20 January 2021, Jewish Care hosted a unique virtual community forum, discussing LGBTI+ conversion practices and the current Change and

Suppression (Conversion) Practices Prohibition Bill. Conversion practices, global and local research about prevalence and harm and the journey that led to the development of the Victorian bill were all discussed on the night, as well as the importance of our community demonstrating their support.

The event involved a panel of influential speakers including Rabbi Gersh Lazarow from Temple Beth Israel; Samuel Murray from Jewish Care: Patrick McIvor from the Brave Network: Nathan Despott from the Brave Network and SOGICE Survivors; Nicola Kolb, a community member and survivor ally; Dr Gávi Ansara from Rosh Pinah, an affirming Orthodox Jewish network; Jarod Rhine-Davis, 2020 B'nai B'rith Changemaker Leadership

Award recipient; and Leah Boulton from Pathways Melbourne.

The forum was co-hosted with the Brave Network, a survivor support and advocacy group, and SOGICE Survivors, a national advocacy and research group, as well as supported by Courage

Commenting on the Government's legislative ban on harmful LGBTI+ conversion practices, Samuel Murray, Jewish Care's Executive sponsor for LGBTI+ inclusive practice, said, "This legislation sends a strong message to all Victorians that conversion practices are not therapeutic, are known to cause significant long-term psychological and emotional harm, and that a person's sexuality or gender identity is real and valid and not a mental disorder to be cured. The real danger to LGBTI+ people and their mental health and wellbeing is societal ignorance, prejudice and the pressure to conform to entrenched heteronormative societal values."

Apart Together

2020 was certainly an unusual year for Jewish Care's Youth Mentoring programs. No sooner had the programs begun when COVID-19 forced the transition to remote and virtual activities. However, our mentor-mentee matches - more than forty pairs in total - found some incredibly creative ways to stay connected. From Zoom chats and socially-distanced walks, to virtual 'watch parties', cooka-longs, museum tours and university open days, matches found ways to get to know one another and build their relationships despite the challenges of the pandemic.

Group activities continued to take place alongside mentor catch-ups, with mentees joining in a range of workshops including trivia, online escape rooms and a multicultural workshop with Big Brother Big Sister.

"I get so much out of the workshops," said one mentee. "I love that even though we are stuck at home I still have something to be a part of outside of school. It gives me something to look forward to - that relaxing, enjoyable hour or so each month where I get to express myself and have fun."

We rounded off the 2020 program with our end of year celebrations. For Youth Aspire, we were delighted to join together in-person - many for the first time - for a celebratory dinner at Spot On Ripponlea. Meanwhile, the Young Achievers participants attended a virtual celebration with speeches, a comedy set and a delicious kosher dinner delivered to their homes.







Mazal Tov Philip AM!

Mazal tov to Philip Mayers AM on recently being awarded an Order of Australia. An Honorary Life Governor of Jewish Care and Circle of Care Gold Member, Philip was Executive Director of Montefiore Homes from 1987 – 1990.

Philip grew up in a progressive Jewish home in Johannesburg, South Africa, where the Jewish values of charity and caring for those less fortunate were espoused by his parents and grandparents. Philip was particularly inspired by his grandmother, Gussie Sussman, whose philanthropic involvements earned her an MBE, the third highest ranking Order of the British Empire award.

A lawyer by training, Philip was very active in the Johannesburg community, helping to establish a school for disadvantaged African children. Disenchanted with life in apartheid South Africa, the Mayers family eventually immigrated to Melbourne.

Philip's many communal roles have contributed significantly to the Victorian Jewish community. He has served as President of Temple Beth Israel and Chairman of the VUPJ, and was an executive committee member of the JCCV, the State Zionist Council and the ECAJ. Philip was also a past Chairman of Make-



A-Wish Foundation and is currently Chairman of Freemasons Foundation of Victoria.

Philip is resolute in his desire to improve the lives of the vulnerable in our community. The values he cherish will continue to benefit our community through the gift he has made to Jewish Care in his Will.

Challenge the Way You Think

Did you know that 1 in 5 Australians – over 4 million are estimated to have a disability? That's approximately 18% of our population. Did you know that there are disabilities which can't be seen such as mental illnesses, intellectual disabilities, visual or hearing impairments and learning disabilities? So there's a good chance you know people who have a disability.

On International Day of People with a Disability, Jewish Care's Disability Services team launched a 12 month social media promotional campaign focused on changing the way people think about disability. With approximately 18% of our community having a disability, this campaign seeks to inform

and educate people about breaking down stereotypes and working towards inclusivity for all members of our community.


The first step towards raising awareness was the launch of a Jewish Care video titled 'Challenge the way you think to change the way you think'.

The second phase included snapshots of three of our clients challenging commonly held misconceptions of people with disabilities' inability to work, inability to live alone and that all disabilities can be seen.



A NEW ERA IN AGED CARE



Residential Home Windsor Open Day

On 28 February 2021, Jewish Care's new Residential Home Windsor opened its doors to the community to witness, firsthand, what this magnificent building and our model of care offers anyone seeking entry into residential aged care.

Visitors were taken on tours of the purpose-built and beautifully appointed home to explore different aspects of the Hand-in-Hand™ model of support that promotes independent living - a new era in aged care. They were able to witness, firsthand, the nurturing environment and our three-tiered aged care product offering: Traditional, Classic and Choice, and other exclusive amenities.

Our new state-of-the-art Senior Living and Community Precinct provides a safe, secure and nurturing environment for our elders and clients and we were delighted to share some of these insights and experiences with our community at the Open Day.

The Holckner Family Senior Living and Community Precinct comprises a spacious 156-bed luxury aged care home that is designed with elders' independence, dignity and wellbeing in mind. Spanning nine storeys, this modern home comprises seven levels of residential aged care and two levels of essential community services including a cafe, synagogue, salon, health and medical services, cinema, rehabilitation services and social justice community services.

Residential Home Carnegie sits at the heart of a vibrant community, central to a nearby shopping strip, medical centres and public transport, all within the leafy surrounds of Melbourne's south-east. This luxurious, modern home accommodates 120 elders across two levels in eight residential houses. Like all Jewish Care homes, our heritage and community is thoughtfully and naturally incorporated and embraced, delivering a new standard of living with a host of features. These include three types of accommodation with en suites, access to gardens, courtyards and balconies, active living and rehabilitation services such as podiatry, physiotherapy and occupational therapy, a contemporary synagogue and a family friendly living environment with cafe, gym, cinema, salon, secure gardens and walking tracks.

Our new Gita Smorgan Family Active Living Centre located in the Hannah & Daryl Cohen Family Building and Ann & Eric Smorgon Active Living Centre in Caulfield have become invigorating spaces for the community to connect with others either through therapeutic interactions or social programs. Designed to support our clients in regaining, maintaining, and optimising their health and wellbeing, our Active Living Centres offer a wide range of supports, groups and programs, including allied health services, social support groups and respite programs.

Since opening the Centres post lockdown, our social support groups have been running a variety of activities throughout the week in a COVID safe way, including individual table activities, tea and coffee meet and greets, news and current affairs, exercise and dancing, gardening and games such as bingo and rumi tiles.

Our Allied Health team continues to provide physiotherapy as an essential service to support people at home and other services such as exercise programs and podiatry services.



Not In Our Community

Jewish Care and Unchain My Heart hosted a virtual event in December 2020 in support of the 16 Days of Activism Against Gender-Based Violence, titled 'Not In Our Community - Not In Any Community'. The event drew a virtual crowd of over 180 attendees, raising awareness about the critical issue of coercive control, a largely invisible form of family violence often referred to as 'intimate terrorism', and its intersection with gett refusal.

Two guest speakers presented, including investigative journalist and author of award-winning book See What You Made Me Do, Jess Hill, and lawyer and gett refusal expert, Joanne Greenaway, CEO of London School of Jewish Studies. Both speakers expertly undercut the common belief that family violence does not occur in the Jewish community and relayed the importance of preventing its harm.

The need for collective action was a key point addressed, including understanding what healthy relationships look and feel like, as well as encouraging conversations in a kind, open and non-judgmental way. As Greenaway summarised, "part of the awareness raising this evening and the work that [we] do, is so people are able to lean on the rest of the community and do not have to suffer on their own."



ORAH Project Supports Jewish Care

The ORAH Project was established in 2016 to create a new revenue stream to provide funds to for-purpose organisations supporting people in need in Jewish communities.
