If the participants in Jewish Care's Yesod leadership program are an indication, the future looks very promising indeed.

Yesod (Hebrew for "foundations") is an exciting new initiative fostering our next generation of Jewish leaders. Open to young professionals in the Jewish community, the 10-month program provides a solid understanding of the professional duties and responsibilities of not-for-profit board directors. Run in partnership with the Australian Institute of Company Directors, the program includes interactive

workshops with key note speakers, firsthand experience with Jewish Care's Board sub-committees, and one-on-one mentoring opportunities for participants and Board members – matched according to their interests and skills.

Our first participants graduated in November 2016 and the feedback from both participants and board members was very positive. One guest speaker said she was heartened to see such bright, thoughtful and enthusiastic young people committed to achieving

meaningful outcomes with their talents. Yesod demonstrates Jewish Care's commitment to building a sustainable community for our future. Our second year is off to a flying start.

SUPPORTING SURVIVORS THROUGH GIVING

Long-time supporter of Jewish Care, Gold Member of Circle of Care, donor and volunteer, Mrs Doreen Kenmar is in the business of giving.

As a third generation Australian raised in a secular environment, Doreen had no idea what her Jewish brethren were enduring in Nazi Europe. It wasn't until she turned 16 that she first met young men from Europe, themselves Holocaust survivors, who recommended she read "The Scourge of the Swastika" by Lord Edward Frederick Langley Russell. "That book changed my life and was the catalyst of my perception of myself as a Jew and part of an extraordinary community", Doreen recalls.

Since then, Doreen's admiration and esteem for Holocaust survivors has only continued to grow. By giving to others,

Doreen demonstrates her gratitude at the luck of the draw that allowed her to grow up in relative peace and comfort in Australia, as compared to the horrors experienced by many of her contemporaries.

"What Jewish Care is doing for Holocaust survivors, people with mental and physical disabilities as well as people who are experiencing financial difficulty, makes me proud to be a Jew," Doreen says. "Jewish Care covers the spectrum of difficulties and needs faced by the community, and that's why I support it".

In addition to being a lifetime supporter, Doreen has also included a gift to Jewish Care in her will. "People want to make a contribution in their lifetime, but also want to leave a legacy of continued giving after their passing," she explains. "This was the perfect vehicle to ensure that funds will be available in the future to continue to care, protect and nurture the vulnerable in our community."

Many people find that after providing for their family and loved ones, they can still contribute towards our community's future by including a charitable gift to Jewish Care.



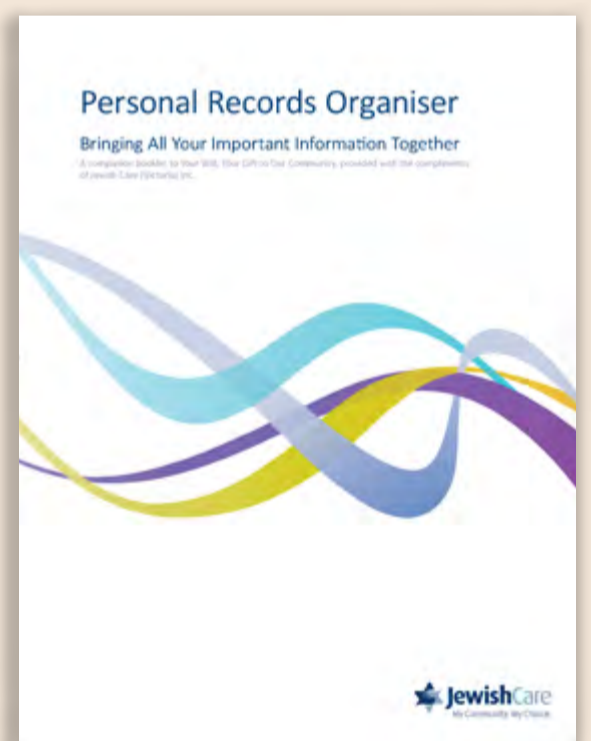

HOUSING STRESS IN THE JEWISH COMMUNITY



Front page headlines have highlighted the plight of Melbourne's homeless. The lack of affordable housing is widespread and many individuals in the Jewish community are struggling as well. Rental accommodation is out of reach for more than 18% of Jewish householders. On any given night, it is presumed that 220 Jewish people in Victoria are

homeless and another 130 are at risk of homelessness.

Jewish Care manages and oversees 88 community properties, providing fixed term, affordable accommodation for more than 165 people. Our services, such as employment and financial counseling, support many of our tenants to eventually gain permanent residence elsewhere.

Once a tenant vacates a Jewish Care property, someone else on our social housing waiting list is able to move in. There are at present more than 20 eligible applicants on our social housing waiting list.

Jewish Care's plan to construct an additional 33 two and three-bedroom social housing units in St Kilda will help address our community's housing shortage. Construction is scheduled to commence as soon as adequate funds have been secured.
